- Practical responses to the work of other artists, designers, craftspeople and photographers must show development in a **personal** way.
- The work submitted for this unit must be produced unaided.
- You must **not** produce work for this unit after the 15 hours of supervised time.

- This paper assesses your understanding of the relationship between the different aspects of Art and Design (Three-Dimensional Design).
- There is no size restriction on work produced for this paper.

- You may use any appropriate three-dimensional media, method(s) and materials, unless the
 question states otherwise.

This paper will test your ability to:

- develop ideas through sustained and focused investigations informed by contextual and other sources, demonstrating analytical and critical understanding
- experiment with and select appropriate resources, media, materials, techniques and processes, reviewing and refining ideas as your work develops
- record in visual and/or other forms, ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions, demonstrating an ability to reflect on your work and progress
- present a personal, informed and meaningful response demonstrating critical understanding, realising intentions and, where appropriate, making connections between visual, written, oral or other elements.

The questions below should be seen as starting points for personal investigations in which you make reference to appropriate critical and contextual material.

Choose **one** of the following questions.

1 Decoration

Brazilian carnival headdresses, the work of the ceramic artist Kate Malone and the Alhambra in Granada are all examples of highly decorated three-dimensional work. Look at examples and produce your own work which makes particular use of decoration.

2 Frameworks

Anish Kapoor's Olympic sculpture, the London Millennium Footbridge, traditional Welsh coracles and theme park rides are constructed using a structural framework. Investigate appropriate examples and produce your own work in which a framework is a feature of the design.

3 Form and Texture

The work of the ceramicist Peter Beard, the sculpture of David Nash and the furniture of Roy Tam are characterised by an emphasis on form and texture which reflects their observations of the natural world. Consider relevant examples and produce your own work based on studies of form and texture.

4 Spiked Forms

The Crown of Thorns in Coventry Cathedral, Gothic cathedral spires and the sculpture of Lynn Chadwick are characterised by spiked forms. Investigate relevant examples and produce your own work based on this theme.

5 Screens

Mies van der Rohe's screen walls in the Tugendhat House, rood or choir screens found in churches and cathedrals, and the flats in theatre scenery may be viewed as dividing elements in interiors. They can be see-through or solid and are often decorative. Investigate appropriate examples and produce your own screen designs, in model form, for a location of your choice.

6 Inside Outside

The sculpture of Rachel Whiteread, the Lloyds Building by the architect Richard Rogers and the anatomical drawings of Leonardo da Vinci have all emphasised the relationship between the inside and the outside. Look at appropriate examples and produce work that explores this theme.

7 Combined Materials

Installations such as those by Jessica Stockholder, work by jewellery designers such as Timothy Information Limited, and sets for television and theatre are often constructed by combining different materials to achieve a desired effect. Look at relevant examples and produce work that combines different materials.

8 Kinetic Work

David C Roy produces kinetic work which often creates illusions. Ralfonso produces kinetic work which relies on natural forces such as wind and water. Jean Tinguely designed mechanically driven forms. Investigate examples and, using water, wind, or mechanical power, develop your own kinetic work.
