Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

Source A Adapted from The Labour Party Manifesto for the General Election of 1964

We shall create a New Britain – mobilising the resources of technology and reversing Tory decline. The crippling consequences of the Tories' free market policies are now well known. They have led to growing stagnation, unemployment and under-employment in large parts of the country. They have brought continuing inflation and soaring land and house prices which have made it almost impossible for many ordinary families to buy or rent a home.

Not even the Tories' stop-go policies have been able to prevent some increase in production and in living standards, but our record is now among the worst in the western world. The Tories still peddle their boast – 'You've never had it so good'.

10 The truth is that Britain could and should have had it a whole lot better.

Source B Adapted from The Conservative Party Manifesto for the General Election of 1964

Under Conservative rule the living standards of the British people have improved more than in the whole of the previous half-century. Over 98% of the working population are in jobs. Rising incomes and lower taxes have made possible a spectacular increase in spending on the essentials, the comforts and what were once regarded as the luxuries of life. One family in every four is living in a new home built under the Conservatives.

What the Labour party has to offer is not a 'New Britain', but a camouflaged return to dreary doctrines which have already proved a failure. What we are offering is an extension of that prosperity which our policies have been proven to achieve.

Source C

The Wilson years were in many ways successful and creative. It was an era of social and sexual freedom. As Paul Johnson wrote in the *New Statesman* after the 1970 election: 'We no longer terrorise homosexuals. We do not force mothers to bring forth unwanted children into the world. We do not murder by the rope'. It was a very good time for the arts and many aspects of education, the Open University in particular. Socially, there was an advance towards a more mobile, less class-ridden world.
