Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

- **Source A** By 1783 political changes were being made within the American states. The struggle with Britain had led to a distrust of central authority and, for the most part, Americans were reluctant to place much power in a national government. The United States remained a loose collection of individual states, without much in the way of a national
 - 5 government. Congress had its weaknesses, but it had waged a successful war and concluded an advantageous peace treaty with a powerful nation. The end of the war made a national government seem less important, and many continued to dislike the idea of a central government that would limit democratic government in state and local politics.

It has been in the States themselves where the benefits of peace and independence, for which we fought and won, have been enjoyed and I am sure the States will continue to improve their constitutions. However, I am uneasy because Congress is so weak and I am concerned that it may not be able to deal with the problems we

- 5 will face. If Congress is to be stronger, then the prejudices and jealousies of the States must end and the States must support the authority and sovereignty of the central government. In a word, the Constitution of Congress must be suitable for the general purposes of government and be able to bind us together. If not, ours will be a fragile unity and, in a short time, we may well be exploited by foreign powers and
- 10 become the sport of European politics, as we argue amongst ourselves.




