1 Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

Source A Adapted from a song created by American helicopter pilots in 1963

We were supporting the ARVNs, A group without guts, Attacking a village Of straw-covered huts.

- 5 The VCs start shooting, They fire a big blast, We off-load the ARVNs They sit on their ass. An armoured battalion
- 10 Just stayed in a trance,
 One captain died trying
 To make them advance.
 When the news was reported
 The ARVNs had won,
- 15 The VCs are laughing Over their captured guns.
- Source B The communists persisted in Vietnam despite the very high death rate, which was higher per head of population than that of Japan in World War II. The most important factor in the war was enemy determination. The North Vietnamese had decided that they were not going to be defeated. If US air strikes knocked down a bridge, hordes of peasants mobilized to repair the destruction caused by the bombs, to build fords or to put in an underwater bridge. The bombing in 1972 may have even strengthened the resolve of a people that were culturally used to adversity.

Source C The massive bombing of South Vietnam was entirely unproductive. Any case for the efficacy of air power rests not on Rolling Thunder, but on Nixon's air campaigns: Freedom Train (April 1972), Linebacker I (May–October 1972) and Linebacker II (the 1972 Christmas bombing). Freedom Train, designed to break

5 morale, failed. A case can be made for the effectiveness of the Linebacker attacks.

Source D

(b) Use **Source A** and your own knowledge.

How useful is **Source A** as evidence of US military views on the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN)? (10 marks)

(c) Use **Sources A**, **B**, **C** and **D** and your own knowledge.

'The main reason the USA failed to win the war was because it abandoned its ally, South Vietnam.'

Assess the validity of this opinion.
